----- ICON OF CHRIST THE HEALER -----

The Christ the Healer icon uses the symbolic language of iconography where everything is happening all at once and time is experienced as a still point of contemplation. The central figure of Jesus the Christ is represented, in pre-resurrection images, clothed in an outer garment of blue and an under garment of red. Blue is called the color of "the mystery of beings" and is the color of transcendence and divinity. Red signifies the life that the Savior brings to the children of God by the shedding of His blood. Over His shoulder is the gold band of His authority as Son of God. The other figures depicted in this icon all find their basis in the healing miracles recounted for us in the Gospels including the Paralytic, the Blind Man, the Man Possessed, the Daughter of Jairus, Lazarus, and the Leper, among others.

----- EARTHQUAKE RELIEF MESSAGE FROM DIOCESE ------




--- Sunday of Orthodoxy ---

The Sunday of the Triumph of Orthodoxy is celebrated on the first Sunday of Great Lent. It is the celebration of the victory of the iconodules over the iconoclasts by the decision of the Seventh Ecumenical Council. Therefore, the service is to commemorate the restoration of icons for use in services and private devotional life of Christians.

AT EVERY DIVINE LITURGY during the Great Fast we read from the Holy Gospel according to Mark — except for today. Why is Jn1:43-51 read on this Sunday, the Sunday of Orthodoxy? The brief answer is that both the Gospel reading and the triumph of Orthodoxy, which we commemorate today, are about seeing God. In the Gospel story we hear how Philip invites Nathaniel to see Jesus (physically); when they meet, Nathaniel sees (spiritually) that Jesus is the Messiah. In the Church, we (physically) see icons; then see (spiritually) that they reflect the reality of Christ's incarnation.

Icons Reveal Christ as God's Image

In the eighth and ninth centuries AD, some Byzantine emperors and churchmen waged a struggle against the use of icons. This conflict was ultimately ended in 843 with the restoration of icons, called in the Church the "Triumph of Orthodoxy." Today's observance celebrates this act.



Iconoclasm formally began in the 720s, when certain bishops began questioning the excessive way in which some people were revering icons. In 730 Emperor Leo III took up their cause and issued a decree forbidding the veneration of religious images, "the evil art of painters," as a later iconoclast council called it. While iconoclasts saw images as a departure from the practice of the early Church, those who supported the veneration of icons did so precisely on the basis of Tradition: the Church had done so for years and was not in error.

It was St John of Damascus (676-749) who gave the Church the insight that the use of icons was the logical consequence of the incarnation of Christ. As he wrote in his *Treatise on the Divine Images*, "In former times, God who is without form or body, could never be depicted. But now, when God is seen in the flesh, conversing with men, I make an image of the God whom I see. I do not worship matter; I worship the Creator of matter, who became matter for my sake." St John's teaching became normative in the Byzantine Church which, since the Triumph of Orthodoxy, has in the minds of many become identified as "the Church of Icons."
