

In the hope of reworking the Cultural Center basement to be space useable for the youth activities, we need to clean out and reconfigure that space, so that it may be tiled, and appropriate youth activities can be purchased. **ADULT EDUCATION:** Adult education sessions will continue during the summer. Information regarding timing and topics to be forthcoming shortly.

THE SUMMER MONTHS: An interesting conundrum that all parishes face is that their summer monthly expenses go up (e.g., greater electricity bills, more renovations) while their donations go down (e.g., folks on vacation, traveling). The simplest solution is for parishioners to be on a regular giving plan via BillPay, ACH, credit card, or Zelle. Please contact the deacons if you need help. As the priest states in the Divine Liturgy during the offering (i.e., anamnesis of the sacrifice), "we offer You Your own, from what is Your own." Theologically, this means everything we give to God is simply a gift back to Him, since everything belongs to Him always. We are simply stewards of it during this life. So, please remember His Church by giving continually through the summer. We can never outgive the gifts that God has showered upon us. Thank you for your consideration.

## ----- UPCOMING AND IMPORTANT EVENTS -----

#### SAT, JUNE 3 - LEAVE TAKING OF PENTECOST

**SUN, JUNE 4 – ALL SAINTS DAY:** The first Sunday after the Feast of Holy Pentecost is observed by the Orthodox Church as the Sunday of All Saints. This day has been designated as a commemoration of all of the Saints, all the Righteous, the Prophets, Apostles, Martyrs, Confessors, Shepherds, Teachers, and Holy Monastics, both men and women alike, known and unknown, who have been added to the choirs of the Saints and shall be added, from the time of Adam until the end of the world, who have been perfected in piety and have glorified God by their holy lives.

The icon of the Sunday of All Saints depicts our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ seated above the throne of heaven surrounded by the Saints. The rows of Saints included the Archangel Michael and other Angels, the Theotokos and John the Baptist, the Apostles, Bishops, Great Martyrs, Ascetics and Monastics. To the side of the throne are Adam and Eve, bowing in reverence to Christ. They are joined by the Saints, who are lifting their hands in worship to the King of Glory. At the lower left of the icon is the Patriarch Abraham who has a righteous soul in his bosom, as told in the story of Lazarus and the rich man in the Gospel. At the lower center is the Good Thief who was crucified with Christ. On the lower right is the Patriarch Jacob.



# MON, JUNE 5 - APOSTLE FAST BEGINS

#### THUR, JUNE 8 – FEAST OF THE DIVINE BODY (LEAVE TAKING IS JUNE 15)

**THUR, JUNE 29 – FEAST OF THE APOSTLES, PETER AND PAUL:** The Feast (or Solemnity) of Saints Peter and Paul is a liturgical feast in honor of the martyrdom in Rome of the apostles Saint Peter and Saint Paul. The celebration is of ancient Christian origin, the date selected being the anniversary of either their death or the translation of their relics. For Melkite Catholics this feast also marks the end of the Apostles' Fast (which began on the Monday following All Saints' Sunday, i.e., the second Monday after Pentecost).

# ----- GOOD SAMARITAN SOCIETY REPORT -----

The Good Samaritan Society (G.S.S.) has accomplished much in the past few months. We are happy to share their report and thank Suely Elias and Marie Hansen for their leadership:

- 3-8-23: The G.S.S. went to I Care Atlanta in Doraville to drop off food and Suely Elias's clothing donations. We talked with staff to get details of the support they provide to the needy and helped to organize food donations in the warehouse.
- 4-23-2023: The G.S.S. took the donations from the Lenten toiletries drive to the Elizabeth Foundation giveaway site at Chamblee Tucker-I-85 and handed out toiletries to the homeless people who needed them. We organized the toiletries by type into separate containers, which made the handing out easy and efficient.
- 5-16-2023: The food donation bin filled up once again and we took these donations to the food pantry at Holy Cross Catholic Church on Chamblee Tucker.

# ----- RENOVATION PROGRESS -----

The Parish Property Council (or Building Council) handles the maintenance and restoration of the property. The following projects have been completed or are in process or in discussion:

- Chapel renovation included the repair of long-time water damage on the walls and ceiling and re-painting (completed). See photo of completed chapel area.
- Front of Cultural Center Hall repair and repair of tiles on carport (in process)
- Asphalt roofing systems inspection and bidding in progress
- Playground set, cultural ctr. bathroom repair (in discussion)
- Cultural center basement carpet replacement and room reconfiguration for youth activities (in discussion). Cleanout day is set for Saturday, June 10<sup>th</sup> as the first step of this project.


- Between \$3,000 and \$5,000 One

#### --- THE GOSPEL ON THE SAINTS ---

The Gospel passage read at the Divine Liturgy on the Sunday of All Saints is not a continuous episode. Rather it is an assemblage of three teachings concerning what it means to aspire to holiness. The first step is that we are called to bear witness to Christ in the world. "Therefore, whoever confesses Me before men, him I will also confess before My Father who is in heaven" (Mt 10:32). Our faith is not meant to be practiced privately, for our personal consolation alone. Rather we are to be witnesses to Him before others.

In today's world, "bearing witness" often means "pointing the finger at" some atrocity or injustice. We are called to "point the finger at" Christ, much as John the Baptist did: "Behold the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world" (Jn 1:29). The simplest way to "point the finger" at the person of Christ is to wear a cross or display an icon in public. Often Evangelical Protestants (who do not display icons) will erect a plaque in their home or on their door with this verse: "But as for me and my house, we will serve the LORD" (Joshua 24:15).

A few years ago, the British government prohibited Christians from wearing a cross in the workplace. A Foreign Office statement defending the policy said, In neither case is there any suggestion that the wearing of a visible cross was a generally recognized form of practicing the Christian faith, still less one that is regarded (including by the applicants themselves) as a requirement of the faith." In response, the former Archbishop of Canterbury, George Carey, commented, "The irony is that when governments and courts dictate to Christians that the cross is a matter of insignificance, it becomes an even more important symbol and expression of our faith." The policy was successfully challenged by two women who had been disciplined for wearing a cross at work.

Witnessing to Christ – even in the Church – may make one unpopular and oppressed. "And he who does not take his cross and follow after Me is not worthy of Me. And he who loves son or daughter more than Me is not worthy of Me" (Mt 10:37). The witness to Christ is thus called, to not only wear a cross, but to bear the cross as Christ did. The saint is one who has heard the Gospel call to put God first in their lives. We may be proud that we go to church, pray or fast. So did the Pharisee in Christ's parable (see Lk 15:11-32). The saint, however, is a person who is ready to put everything else aside to focus on God and His love for us. "He who loves father or mother more than Me is not worthy of Me. And he who loves son or daughter more than Me is not worthy of Me" (Mt 10:37).

The spiritual son of St Simeon the New Theologian, Nicetas Stethatos, says that there are three kinds of people in the world: "the carnal man, who wants to live for his own pleasure, even if it harms others; the natural man, who wants to please both himself and others, and the spiritual man, who wants to please only God, even if it harms himself" (cited in Tito Colliander's Way of the Ascetics, 5). The ascetic in a monastic setting or in the world strives to be that spiritual man: to love nothing or no one more than God.

The final section in this Gospel pastiche is Christ's promise that those who have left home and family for His sake will receive a hundred times more in this life, and eternal life in the age to come (see Mt 19:29). This promise is often interpreted to mean that those who go off to serve Christ will prosper materially. It may be the opposite: that those who place Christ first in their lives will find that He is worth a hundred times more than what the world has to offer and that they will find contentment in what they do have—a place in the kingdom of God.
