

--- FEAST OF THE ENCOUNTER IN THE TEMPLE ---

This feast, celebrated on February 2, is known in the Orthodox Church as The Presentation of Christ in the Temple. Another name for the feast is The Meeting of our Lord. Roman Catholic and Protestant Christians call the feast The Purification of the Holy Virgin. About 450 AD in Jerusalem, people began the custom of holding lighted candles during the Divine Liturgy of this feast day. Therefore, some churches in the West refer to this holy day as Candlemas. The Feast of the Presentation concludes the observances related to the Nativity of Christ, a period that opened on November 15 with the beginning of the Nativity fast.

<u>Biblical Story</u> - The story of the Presentation is told in Luke 2:22-29. Mary and Joseph were faithful Jews and observed their religious customs. An important custom was for the couple to take their first-born son to the Temple. The baby was taken to the Temple forty days after his birth and was dedicated to God. In addition, if the parents were wealthy, they were to bring a lamb and a young pigeon or a turtle dove to be offered as a sacrifice at the Temple. The custom provided that if the parents were poor, they were to offer two pigeons or two turtle doves for the sacrifice. Jo seph and Mary were not wealthy, so they took two turtle doves with them to offer as a sacrifice at the Temple. When Jesus was forty days old, Mary and Joseph took Him to the Temple in Jerusalem. They were not wealthy, so they took two turtle doves with them to



offer as a sacrifice at the Temple. As they arrived at the Temple, Mary and Joseph were met by a very old man named Simeon. He was a holy man and was noted as a very intelligent scholar. Simeon spent much time studying about the prophets of Israel. It was during his studies that he learned of the coming of the Messiah. The Jewish people were waiting for the Messiah to come and deliver Israel from their conquerors. From that time on, Simeon spent his time praying for the Messiah to come. He spent many years in prayer. Finally, while Simeon was praying he heard the voice of God. God promised Simeon that he would not die until he had seen the Messiah. When Simeon saw Jesus, he took the baby in his arms and blessed the Lord and said: "Lord, now let Your servant go in peace according to Your promise, because my eyes have seen Your salvation which you have prepared before the face of all peoples, a light to bring revelation to the Gentiles, and the glory to your people Israel." Also, in the Temple was Anna the Prophetess. She had been a widow for many years. Anna was about eighty-four years old and spent her time in the Temple worshiping, fasting, and praying. When she saw the Christ Child she praised God and spoke of him to all who were awaiting the Messiah. After Jesus was presented in the Temple, the family returned to Galilee to the town of Nazareth. The Bible tells us that Jesus grew and became strong, and was filled with wisdom.

A PRAYER FOR LENT: The Prayer of Saint Ephraim the Syrian is traditionally said many times throughout each day during Great Lent, in addition to our daily prayers. This prayer lists all the negative and positive elements of repentance and constitutes a "check list" for our individual Lenten effort. Our effort is aimed first at liberating ourselves from certain spiritual diseases which shape our life and make it virtually impossible for us to even start turning to God. A second aspect of this effort is striving to attain the virtues necessary to grow in Christlikeness, which is how we live out our return to God.

Lord and Master of my life, give me not a spirit of sloth, vain curiosity, lust for power, and idle talk. (Prostration) But give to me, Your servant, a spirit of purity, humility, patience and love. (Prostration)

Lord and King, grant me to see my own sins and not to condemn my brother, for blessed are You for ever and ever. Amen. (Prostration)

Next week, we will talk about the different weeks of Great Lent, and the various commemorations we observe each Sunday in Lent.



--- A BRIEF HISTORY OF FASTING ---

The roots of fasting in the Christian Church are to be found in the Old Testament and the Jewish religion, both for certain days and certain foods. The first Christians practiced fasting for only two or three days a week, Wednesday and Friday. In the West, some places added Saturday. Over time the custom of fasting for 40-days before Easter developed, and was known by the time of the First Ecumenical Council (325).

Over time there was a gradual increase in the number of weeks for the Lenten Fast. Seven weeks were established in the East and six in the West by the mid-sixth century. The difference in the number of weeks was due to the inclusion in the West of Saturday as a fast day. In the East Saturday was not a fast day except the Saturday of Holy Week. During the seventh century, the West added four days before the beginning of the six weeks of Lent, starting with Wednesday, known as Ash Wednesday. The Church in the East added an additional week before the seven weeks, known as Cheese Week, to complete the 40 days of fasting in Lent before Easter, excluding the seven Saturdays and eight Sundays, which are non-fast days.

GENERAL RULES OF THE LENTEN FAST

Fasting is always tied to a religious event or feast. By itself, it has no meaning for Christians. Fasting is a means to growing in Christian virtues, as well as prayer, devotion and purity. It is also related to giving alms to the poor.

The Lenten Fast rules we observe today were established within the monasteries of the Orthodox Church during the sixth through eleventh centuries. These rules are intended for all Eastern (Orthodox and Catholic) Christians, not just monks and nuns. In the Christian East, these rules are seen as ideals for which we strive. Each year, we can try to get closer to the ideal than we did the previous year. Fasting is not for the sake of fasting alone. It is important to keep in mind our own personal circumstances, such as health, age, etc. What follows is an explanation of the Fast as an ideal, in its most strict sense. Each person should prayerfully discern how best to keep the fast, in consultation with their spiritual father or mother, or parish priest.

The first week of Lent is especially strict. For Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday some keep a total fast. Some eat a little each day after sunset. Others fast com-pletely on Monday and then eat only uncooked food (bread, fruit, nuts) on Tuesday evening. On Wednesday, the fast is kept until after the Presanctified Liturgy. From the second through the sixth weeks of Lent, the general rules for fasting are practiced. Meat, animal prod-ucts (cheese, milk, butter, eggs, lard), fish (meaning fish with backbones), olive oil and wine (all alcoholic drinks) are not consumed during the weekdays of Great Lent. Octopus and shell-fish are allowed, as is vegetable oil. On weekends, ol-ive oil and wine are permitted. According to what was done in the monasteries, one meal a day is eaten on weekdays and two meals on weekends of Great Lent. No restriction is placed on the amount of food during the meal, though moderation is always encouraged in all areas of one's life at all times.

Fish, oil and wine are normally allowed on the Feast of the An-nunciation (March 25) and on Palm Sunday (one week before Easter). This year, because the Annunciation falls on Great and Holy Monday, fish will not be allowed. On other feast days, such as the First and Second Finding of the Head of Saint John the Baptist (February 24), the Holy Forty Martyrs of Sebaste (March 9), the Forefeast of the Annunciation (March 24) and the Synaxis of the Archangel Gabriel (March 26), wine and oil are permitted.
